

Wordiness

In Corbett's *The Little English Handbook* (5th edition), a **wordy sentence** is defined as "one in which a writer has used more words than are needed to say what has to be said. The superfluous words simply clutter up a sentence and impede its movement." This definition is pretty hard to understand, right? That is because of its wordiness; in general, the more concise a statement, the easier it is to understand.

When writing, it's easy to use extra words in order to emphasize style by creating a fabulous metaphor, giving a detailed description, and so on, but it is often better (for your reader and your instructor) to avoid wordiness.

Examples:

Wordy: In this modern world of today, we must get an education that will prepare us for a job in our vocation in life. (23 words)

Revised: In the modern world, we must get an education that will prepare us for a job. (16 words)

Wordy: These rivers do not contain fish, due to the fact that the flow of water is too rapid. (18 words)

Revised: These rivers do not contain fish because the water flows too rapidly. (12 words)

Wordy: The meaning, at least in my own eyes, that he is trying to convey in the poem "Arms and the Boy" is of the evilness of war in that it forces innocent people to take up the instrument of death and destruction and then tries to teach them to love to use them to kill other human beings. (58 words)

Revised: As I see it, the poet's thesis in "Arms and the Boy" is that war is evil, because it not only forces people to take up arms but makes them use these weapons to kill other human beings. (38 words)
